Read the verse from Proverbs and its explanation:

"As face answers to face in water,

So does one man's heart to another"

(Proverbs 27:19)

This verse teaches us a lesson through a parable.

When you look into water, you see your face reflecting back at you, exactly the same way that your face looks in reality: if I smile at the reflection in the water, it will smile back at me.

If I cry – the reflection that will be reflected back to me will be crying.

That's how people's hearts are.

If I treat someone in a certain way, I will be treated back in the same way.

How is the verse: "As face answers to face in water, So does one man's heart to another" connected to the Mishna that we learned?
